Sambhav celebrates a year marked by remarkable achievements reinforcing the organization's overarching vision. More than 400 children now thrive through the remedial education program, underscoring Sambhav's commitment to nurturing future generations. The Medical Health Unit program has made a significant impact, extending vital healthcare services to over 25,000 individuals contributing to the community's overall well-being. In Pithampur, a collective effort of 1100 women has emerged, propelling them beyond savings to explore new avenues of livelihood. Some are undergoing training as skilled workers, while others are actively engaging with markets. Meanwhile, in Lucknow, Sambhav pioneers a fresh chapter in women's empowerment by imparting skills in the intricate arts of chikan and zari embroidery, further enriching the cultural heritage of the region.

Strategic Approach

- Women Empowerment through community-based group formation, which includes micro-saving at the internal level through Self Help Groups and Financial Inclusion.
- Promoting better livelihood and standard of living through livelihood promotion programs, which include capacity building and direct/indirect support.
- Contributing to the sector goal of improving health and nutrition through health promotion programs.
- Improving access to sanitation, safe drinking water, and better hygiene.
- Promoting water conservation and sustainable agriculture through watershed development.
- Working in close convergence with the government machinery to make ground-level interventions and introductions sustainable and participatory.
- To work with the people and not for them.



How do We Work:

Sambhav in its operations believes in working with the people and not for them. As a result of the same thought process, all the programs are designed and implemented with maximum ownership and participation of the community. The community-based groups and support groups identified from within the community play a critical role in deciding upon the modus-operandi of the program. This is also critical from the sustainability point of view. Once the organization is not able to continue the program in an area, the entire process should not collapse, hence the community needs to be in the center of program implementation.

- **Transparency:** Provisions of accessible and timely information to the community and the opening of organizational procedures, structures, and processes to their assessment.
- **Participation:** Enabling the community to play an active role in the decision-making process and the activities that affect them.
- **Monitoring and evaluation:** Establishing processes through which Sambhav, with involvement from the community, monitors and reviews its progress and results against goals and objectives, feeds learning back into the organization on an ongoing basis, and reports on the results of the process.
- **Complaints and response mechanisms:** Mechanisms through which Sambhav enables its beneficiaries to address complaints against its decisions and actions and through which it ensures that these complaints are properly reviewed and acted upon.

“Engaged with the Self-Help Group program for 36 months, Ankita Patel actively participates in regular meetings and interfaces through financial institution meetings to explore avenues for increasing her income and employment opportunities. Initially running a grocery store, she expanded her inventory by taking a loan from the group and later secured a loan from the ICICI Bank through the group. With the loan, she purchased a sewing machine and initiated a tailoring business. In addition to sewing at home, she started taking sewing jobs from factories, leading to a monthly income increase to ₹8000. Now, she aspires to further enhance her economic condition by selling wholesale goods from her grocery store.”



E-Community

In 2023, the project in 7 slums of Pithampur, Madhya Pradesh, has made significant strides across Education, Women Empowerment, and Health. The results speak for themselves:

- **Education:** Over 1000 students, a remarkable 163% increase, have been part of our program for a minimum of 6 months, totaling 1400+ children. We've established 7 formally running Remedial Education Centers, resulting in 53 dropouts (80%) being re-enrolled in school.
- **Women Empowerment:** A total of 1147 women have undergone training in Life Skills and financial literacy. Our efforts have led to the formation of 115 self-help groups, connecting 1177 women. These groups collectively saved Rs. 32,45,200, with new enterprises launched by 8 SHG women.
- **Health:** The project organized 33 mega health camps, serving over 3000 patients. Additionally, we provided essential training to 1923 adolescents on menstrual hygiene and 1909 pregnant and lactating women on mother and child health through 57 programs. The Medical Health Unit provided consultation and referral services to over 12500 people this year.

With credit support extended to 45 SHGs worth Rs. 76,17,500, and ongoing efforts in savings, inter-lending, and the establishment of new enterprises, our project is making a tangible difference in the lives of the communities we serve.



CHIKANKARI

Chikankari embroidery, a timeless form of art, venerates the finesse and resilience inherent in women. This intricate craft, demanding precision and skill, embodies the meticulous dedication women invest in their work. Through Chikankari, women unleash their creativity, metamorphosing plain fabric into a canvas of exquisite beauty. This traditional embroidery not only safeguards cultural heritage but also serves as an economic catalyst, empowering women to achieve self-reliance and autonomy. Each stitch tells a narrative of tradition, elegance, and the enduring spirit of women. Chikankari embroidery stands as a living testament to the indispensable role women play in the preservation of art, culture, and the legacy of skilled craftsmanship.

Embarking on a transformative journey in Lucknow, where our program uplifts women artisans through comprehensive Chikan and Zari handicraft training. Going beyond skill development, this visionary project establishes a dedicated Production Center, creating economic opportunities while safeguarding the cultural heritage of Chikan and Zari craftsmanship. Join us in supporting this gentle yet impactful initiative that not only empowers artisans but also cherishes and sustains the artistic legacy of Chikan and Zari, adding a touch of tradition to contemporary endeavours.

Why Tashi:

It's important to acknowledge the multifaceted talents and capabilities that artisans possess, extending beyond their primary craft. It's disheartening to observe that many artisans find themselves compelled to undertake additional jobs like manual labor, rickshaw pulling, and other labor-intensive work simply to make ends meet when their primary craft falls short of providing sufficient financial support. This unfortunate situation is mainly a result of a lack of opportunities for skill enhancement, leaving them ill-equipped to adapt to the constantly evolving demands of the market. The need for support in enhancing their skills is paramount to ensure these artisans can thrive and sustain themselves.



AAROGYAM

Equipped with a team of experienced medical and para medical professionals, medicines in stock and basic lab tests, the Medical Health Unit caters to over 20 identified villages in Dhar and Indore to provide preventive as well as curative healthcare services.

A HEALTH JOURNEY

In rural parts of Dhar poor health underscores a critical need for robust healthcare interventions. Limited access to healthcare facilities and resources exacerbates the plight of residents, leaving a substantial portion of the population vulnerable to preventable diseases and untreated conditions. The communities bear the burden of both physical suffering and the economic consequences of unmet health needs.

Aarogyam is a step towards making the ends meet for these populations through a multi-dimensional health inte-



vention. The MHU not only provides quality doorstep health services but also actively engages to promote health for all. Through awareness sessions, video shows, and engagement with local health institutions, the program addresses various health issues, such as menstrual health, women and child health, hygiene, and locally prevalent diseases. In response to a major conjunctivitis outbreak this year, the MHU efficiently treated over 100 patients daily, offering immediate health support to over 6000 people within two months. This is added with promoting menstrual and personal hygiene through distribution of sanitary napkins and soaps.



Sashakt Gram

Sashakt Gram heavily takes its motives from the concept of Community Health. Community health focuses on studying, protecting, or improving health within a community. It does not focus on a group of people with the same shared characteristics, like age or diagnosis, but on all people within the geographical region of 14 villages of in Dhar, Dewas and Indore district of Madhya Pradesh.

Dimensions of the Program:

- Curative Health Care
- Referral Liaison

Why the Need of Sashakt Gram MHU:

- Rural Health Centers are critically short of trained medical personal.
- 8% PHC's don't have doctor's.
- 39% PHCs do not have Lab Technicians.
- 18% PHCs do not have a Pharmacist.
- 75% graduate doctors live in urban areas, serving only 28% of the population.
- Mobile Medical Units are the best & most viable solution.

- The MHU made a significant impact through a well-coordinated intervention during the conjunctivitis and viral outbreak that swept through the region. Over 60+ patients were being seen at the MHU during the conjunctivitis outbreak and provided with free medicines on daily basis for two months.
- Over time, MHU's influence has grown steadily, gaining substantial support from both the Gram Panchayat and Government Institutions. This has allowed for the effective organization of health sessions and camps within the project area, amplifying the outreach of healthcare initiatives.
- In meeting patients' medical needs, MHU sets a remarkable standard, offering check-ups, diagnoses, and treatments in a manner that resonates with the patients. This patient-centric approach solidifies MHU's position as the primary and preferred choice for healthcare, positioning them as the frontline of treatment.

>>> RADIO DHADKAN 107.8 MHZ

The Radio Station at Shivpuri, Madhya Pradesh after going through a difficult phase with challenges of sustenance has got it GOPA renewal. As of date the Radio Station operated for 3 hours a day airing program of local relevance. To ensure uninterrupted power supply at the station, a roof-top solar solution has been deployed, making sure things keep on moving.

MEDYSEVA <<<

Medyseva is a healthcare Telemedicine service. It seeks to become the ultimate healthcare partner of all citizens such that they can get access to high quality healthcare services with ease and at affordable prices. It bridges the gap between the urban doctors and rural patients through Medyseva Kendras having state-of-the-art technology. Sambhav has partnered with Medyseva to be a service provider in Gwalior and Shivpuri.



>>> VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

Sambhav is working on violence against women in slums of Gwalior, with an approximate population of 30,000. The program is providing training, information and skill to the women and adolescent girls, to protect themselves from violence.

Violence for above purpose can be defined as physical, mental, economic and psychological, at both places inside and outside of the house.
